Working with the faculty, Student Chiefs oversee clinic sessions and evening seminars, manage the clinic schedule, patient flow, medical records, and medical formulary and supplies and provide teaching and mentoring to the junior students. Student Chiefs thus have the opportunity to hone their leadership and teaching skills while obtaining practical training in practice management. Each Student Chief has primary responsibility for at least one of the major administrative functions of the clinic or its programs, which include educational innovation and community outreach. This clinic provides care to an at-risk youth and a predominantly homeless population with a high incidence of IV drug use.

By seeing patients in the hospital, the FPC, and the ER, the student will experience firsthand the concept of primary, comprehensive, and continuous care.
