The population of the city and surrounding countryside has a high rate of chronic illness, including diabetes, hypertension, heart disease, asthma, and related complications. They also suffer from infections and skin conditions found more commonly in the tropics. Students will provide patient care under direct attending supervision. In addition, students will be responsible for preparing a scholarly project related to the clinical experience and attend a minimum of four (4) of the dinner seminars on cross-cultural medicine and international health topics offered as curriculum and preparation for the experience.
